Every furnishing was designed with respect to the views and architectural lines of the space. A low dining room table specially designed by Habachy brings the eye below the window line and complements the rest of the low-slung, minimalist furniture. Everything–furniture, accessories, light fixtures—works with the space instead of against it. The result is an open, organized sense of continuity throughout the loft.

"One of our primary focuses was keeping every room communal," John says. "There are no chairs in here. Every area is more of a place where you can gather, and we did that on purpose."

The life of newlyweds can be hectic, but with most of the renovations already completed and their home almost perfect, the Douglases can reflect on the collaborative process with a smile.
